Factors Potentially Impacting Tax Levy Limit ...

- Average annual increase in CPI-U expected at or near 2.0%
- 1.0060 tax base growth factor for HUFSD (1.0000 = no growth)
- Carry-over from 2017-18
- Payments in lieu of taxes (PILOTs)
- Other allowable exemptions (not anticipated)

Significant Budgetary Considerations ...

- New Federal tax code
- State budget revenue shortfall
- Contractual salary/benefit cost increases
- Increase in TRS contributions (from 9.8 to 10.5-11.0% of certificated salaries)
- Contracted service increases
- Interest rates
- Other mandated costs (e.g., Part 154)
- Limited or no increase in state aid anticipated

Long Island School District Realities ...

- 38 Long Island school districts, enrolling 45% of the region's students, fall below the state's average in terms of income and property wealth (CWR < 1.0).
- According to federal guidelines, over 32% of the students enrolled in Long Island school districts qualify for free or reduced-price lunch, a 77.7% increase since 2007-2008.
- Long Island has experienced a 29.4% increase in English language learners (ELLs) since 2007-08 and a 336% increase since 1991-1992. Approximately 13% of students on Long Island are ELLs.
- Since 2007, there has been an 8.8% increase in the number of students with disabilities in Long Island schools.

State Aid Allocations ...

- Total state aid makes up approximately 40% of the budgeted spending for Long Island's low wealth districts. The Long Island average is 25%. In 2017-18, state aid represented approximately 13.4% of Huntington's revenue budget.
- State aid dollars have less purchasing power on Long Island than in any other region in the state. The purchasing power of \$1,000 in the lowest cost regions (North Country and Mohawk Valley) is the equivalent of \$702 on Long Island/NYC.

Foundation Aid ...

- Foundation Aid comprises nearly 70% of all New York State school aid.
- If the Foundation Aid Formula had been fully funded, Long Island schools would have received an additional \$5.92 billion over the past 10 years.
- Long Island's Foundation Aid as a percentage of total Long Island aid is over 4.5% lower than that of the state as a whole.
- In 2016-17, Huntington received just short of \$8.5M; if the formula were fully funded, the district would have received \$17.8M.
