STUDENT ENGAGEMENT

- ✓ Cognitive/Intellectual/Academic Engagement captures students' effort, investment in work, and strategies for learning. This dimension, focusing primarily on engagement during instructional time and with instruction-related activities, can be described as **engagement of the mind.**
- ✓ Social/Behavioral/Participatory Engagement emphasizes students' actions and participation within the school outside of instructional time, including non-academic school-based activities, social and extracurricular activities, and interactions with other students. This dimension can be described as **engagement in the life of the school.**
- ✓ Emotional Engagement encompasses students' feelings of connection to their school. This dimension can be described as **engagement of the heart.**

- ✎ Only miss class if absolutely necessary

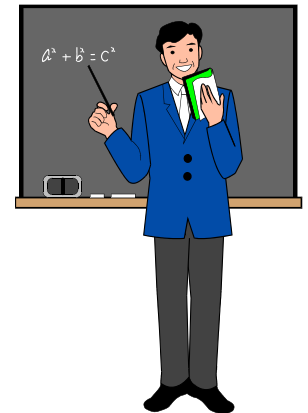
PARENTS

- ✎ Discuss the importance of attendance and punctuality with your child
- ✎ Make sure your child gets 8 hours of sleep every night
- ✎ Provide punctual transportation / traffic backs up after 7:10 a.m.
- ✎ Schedule doctors appointments after school hours
- ✎ Provide the proper documents for all absences



What teachers do to help students succeed

- ❖ Discuss absences / latenesses with students
- ❖ Allow students to make up missed work and award credit for work that has been made up (for excused absences only)
- ❖ Contact families when absences or other factors affect student performance
- ❖ Provide extra help
- ❖ Notify parents of general concerns



What guidance counselors do to help students succeed



- Follow-up with students regarding excessive absences
- Conduct timely phone calls to parents about student concerns and schedule team meetings (as needed)
- Meet weekly with the principal to monitor students in need of support
- Work collaboratively with department supervisors to set up after school tutoring with students from the various honor societies (Monday – Thursday in HHS library)

What administrators do to help students succeed

- ❖ Generate daily phone calls home and quarterly written notifications to parents regarding attendance issues
- ❖ Meet with staff members to implement academic and behavioral strategies
- ❖ Closely monitor the academic progress of students through informal and formal marking periods (every five weeks) and initiate interventions for students experiencing difficulty

REGENTS DIPLOMA WITH ADVANCED DESIGNATION

Total of 9 Regents exams (minimum grade of 65 on all exams)

- 1 English
- 2 Social Studies
- 2 Science (Life Science & Physical Science)
- 3 Math (Integrated Algebra, Geometry, Algebra 2/Trigonometry)
- 1 World Language *

* May substitute 5 units of a sequence in Art , Music , or Career Technical Education/Business



REGENTS DIPLOMA

Total of 5 Regents exams (minimum grade of 65 on all exams)

- English
- World History
- U.S. History
- Science Regents
- Integrated Algebra

HONORS DESIGNATION

- Regents Diploma with Advanced Designation with Honors requires a total 9 Regents exams with an average of a 90 or better
- Regents Diploma with Honors requires a total of 5 Regents exams with an average of 90 better



LOCAL & IEP DIPLOMAS

Local Diploma

This option is available to classified students. It requires students to fulfill the necessary courses and credits, as well as earn a minimum score of 55 on each of the five required Regents examinations

IEP Diploma

A classified student has not been able to fulfill one or more of the Regents exams with a 55 or better, but has met the learning standards as per the student's Individual Educational Plan (IEP)

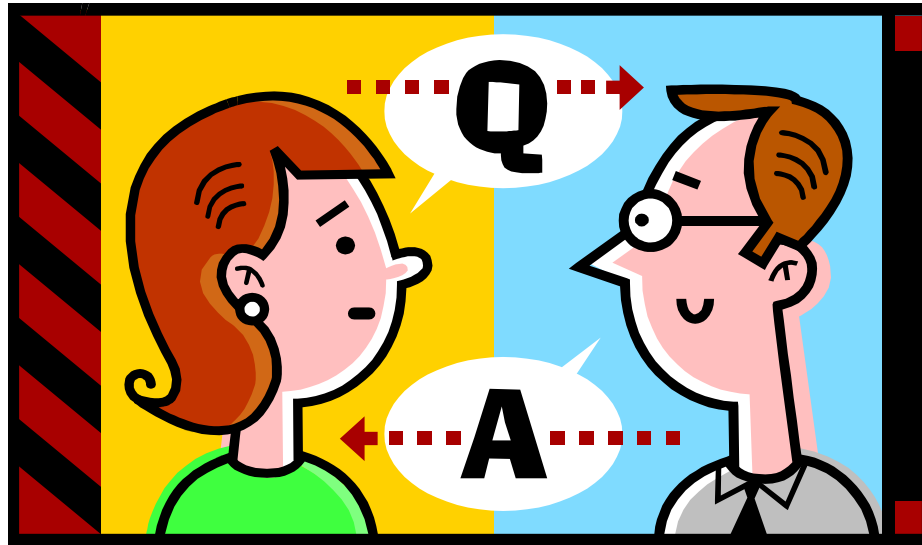
