CLUBS AND ACTIVITIES 2021 - 2022

WORLD OF DIFFERENCE (AWOD): Students participate in projects that promote unity among the various ethnic and racial groups at Huntington High School.

ART HONOR SOCIETY: This organization works to inspire and recognize those students who have a profound love of art and/or demonstrate creative talent. Students in the Art Honor Society work to promote art in the school, community and internationally through various activities and service projects. The students help one another to achieve the highest standards and share the importance of art education throughout the district and the community.

DEBATE CLUB: Students discuss a host of current issues from a variety of perspectives. Debate Club offers an opportunity to build their skills in openly and effectively communicating points of view.

DISPATCH: Huntington High School's award-winning student newspaper. Students act as reporters, editors, and photographers.

DRAMA CLUB: This club presents three productions a year: a comedy or drama in the fall; Senior Follies, a spoof of Huntington High School, in the winter; and a spring musical.

ENGLISH HONOR SOCIETY: Membership is an honor bestowed on individuals selected for their accomplishments in the field of English and in overall academic achievement. Our members share their love of language and literature with the greater school community, demonstrating their commitment to social responsibility.

ENVIRONMENTAL CLUB: Students work together to improve our school and global environments with a focus on sustainability and Earth friendly advocacy.

ET CETERA: Students write creative or non-fiction stories, poems, and/or create art in individually and through guided prompts, then edit and publish their work in our school magazine.

WORLD LANGUAGE NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETIES: These clubs honor excellence in the study of French, Spanish, Latin and Italian and serve the community through service and fund-raising.

ESPORTS GAMING CLUB: Gamers at all levels of experience can enjoy the world of Esports in a fun and competitive environment. Students will have the opportunity to play at either the recreational or the competitive level. GAY/STRAIGHT ALLIANCE (GSA): A coalition of gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, and heterosexual individuals offering support, acceptance, and awareness in a safe environment. Students may participate in any number of activities to make sexuality, sexual identity, and gender identity an accepted part of Huntington High School.

GRADE LEVEL CLASS LEADERSHIP: Student government/class leadership is an excellent way to get involved in the Huntington community. Students who participate in their class government help to plan major events such as homecoming, float night and the prom, in addition to smaller fundraisers throughout the year. Class leaders are responsible for motivating the members of their class and the entire student body to participate in school sponsored events.

GRANDFRIENDS: Students, after completing a five-week training program, visit senior citizens at home.

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY: The students work together with other Suffolk schools to provide simple and decent housing for Suffolk County families. They are responsible for raising awareness, raising funds to build the house and raising the walls of a house.

NATIONAL HISTORY DAY: Students explore issues affecting society ranging from animal rights to their roles and responsibilities as citizens in our society.

HIGHSTEPPERS: Members strive to increase guard, kick and dance skills, and do some choreography.

HHS YEARBOOK: The Huntingtonian captures in photos our life at Huntington High School. Sports, clubs, and special events are included.

INTERACT CLUB: This is a community service based club that works closely with the Rotary and gives students the chance to make a real difference in communities, both local and abroad, while having fun. Interact club carries out community service projects that help others while developing friendships, leadership skills and making international connections.

KEY CLUB: The main purpose of the Key Club is to raise money for children in need. This is done through creative fundraising and student generated activities. Two blood drives are sponsored each year. This is a school and community service club affiliated with Kiwanis, an international program.

MATH HONOR SOCIETY: Mu Alpha Theta - Students work with other students as peer tutors to help them successfully complete Regents level math classes.

MATHLETES: Students practice math puzzles and problem-solving techniques to compete with other schools.

MOCK TRIAL: Participants compete against Suffolk County high schools in mock trials with students advocating as lawyers and witnesses. The purpose of Mock Trial is to enhance a student's confidence in public speaking and educate them on the legal system.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY: Activities include tutoring and performing community service. Huntington High School is privileged to have a chapter of the National Honor Society. Membership in the National Honor Society is granted on the basis of faculty selection and such membership is conferred upon those students who have distinguished themselves by being outstanding in the areas of Scholarship, Service, Leadership and Character. The National Chapter's selection guides define these criteria as follows:

Scholarship: Any student who has completed at least sophomore year and has a cumulative grade point average of 90% or better.

<u>Service</u>: Service is defined in terms of performance. Valid questions are: What contributions has this candidate made to the school, community and classmates?

<u>Leadership</u>: The leadership criterion is regarded as highly important for membership selection. Schools may consider leadership roles in both school and community. Leadership may include elected positions, contributions made in the classroom, or positive cooperative behavior in the school situation which would set a good example for other students to follow.

<u>Character:</u> Integrity: No recorded incidents of cheating or of intentional dishonesty. Positive behavior: No record of knowingly violating school regulations. No record of civil offenses within the community. Willing to assist classmates, faculty members, etc. Ethics: Wants to do the "right" thing in most situations.

Students who are interested in becoming members of National Honor Society must contact Mr. Cohen. They will receive complete details to see if they meet the academic requirement. Once this criterion has been met, the student is invited to complete an information packet. Packets will be distributed and the selection process will be explained at a meeting held in October. Attendance is mandatory for all prospective applicants. Students will be notified by mail as to the decision of the Faculty Council.

NATURAL HELPERS: Students who advise others are supported through this club.

NEW WORLD - ENL MENTORING CLUB: In this collaborative group, students assist other students as they become increasingly attuned to a new way of life & schooling system. Newcomers are paired with current students who help to guide and mentor their peers.

READY STEP: Students compete against other districts in step (dance) competition.

ROBOTICS TEAM: Members will have an opportunity to learn teamwork, engineering, programing, problem solving and critical thinking skills all while having fun. Students learn important STEM* (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) concepts that can help them throughout their academic and professional careers. Team members will use various tools to build robots and machines, program them to perform specific tasks, troubleshoot problems, and refine their strategies to address practical challenges.

SCIENCE NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY: This organization encourages and recognizes scientific and intellectual thought, advance student knowledge of civic community to encourage a dedication to the pursuit of scientific knowledge that benefits all humankind. Membership is open to all Juniors and Seniors who are currently enrolled in a Regents level or higher course and have completed 2 years of Regents level or higher science. Students must have a minimum science average of 90%, an overall scholastic average of at least 85%, and a minimum math average of 80%. Students must be enrolled in a science course while they are members of the society.

SCIENCE RESEARCH: Students who enjoy solving novel science projects enter interscholastic competitions.

SOCIAL STUDIES HONOR SOCIETY: This organization will work to honor successes in, dedication to, and passion for the study of History. Members will play a role in local preservation, engage in charitable works, highlight success in Social Studies and provide the community and students opportunities to engage in history and current affairs.

STAGE CREW: Students participate in behind-the-scene work with the Drama Club and community productions and concerts.

STUDENT GOVERNMENT: This organization assists in the management of the school, providing a forum for student voice.

TRI-M MUSIC HONOR SOCIETY: Service group for the Music Department.

UNITED AMIGOS: This is a club of dedicated, multicultural students who take pride in assisting the ESL pupils to achieve success at Huntington High School. These students provide mentoring, social and tutoring services to anyone in need.

A Planning List for Parents of Ninthand 10th-Graders

It may seem early to start thinking about getting your child ready for college, but it really isn't — important groundwork should take place in ninth and 10th grades. Here's a list to help you make sure your child is on the right path.

GRADE 9

- Create a four-year high school plan. Once your child is settled into ninth grade, introduce the idea of preparing an overall plan for high school that relates to their goals.
 - Make sure you and your child know what high school courses are required by colleges, and that their ninthgrade courses are on the right track.
 - Map out when these courses should be taken.
 - Familiarize yourself with the various levels of courses offered by your child's school.
- 2. Tell your child to start thinking about careers.
 Encourage your child to develop a tentative career goal.
 Of course it will change often but it's the thought process that counts.
 - Help your child to identify interests likes and dislikes — not just in academics but in all areas. This will help your child focus on goals.
 - Encourage your child to discuss career options with others, such as the school counselor, teachers, recent college graduates who are working, professionals in the community, etc.
- Suggest extracurricular activities. Encourage your child to actively take part in a sport, school club, music or drama group, or community volunteer activity.
 - If your child may want to play sports in college, research the National College Athletic Association

- eligibility requirements. The NCAA requires completion of certain core courses; you can find the specifics at www.eligibilitycenter.org.
- 4. Meet with the school counselor. The school counselor knows how to help your child get the most out of high school. Make sure your child has an opportunity during the school year to discuss post-high-school plans with the school counselor and map out courses to take during the rest of high school.
 - You should participate in this meeting, too.
- 5. Ask if the PSAT 8/9™ is offered to ninth-graders. The PSAT 8/9 will help you and your child's teachers figure out what your child needs to work on the most so that they're ready for college when they graduate from high school. It tests the same skills and knowledge as the SAT°, PSAT/NMSQT°, and PSAT™ 10 in a way that makes sense for their grade level.
- Save for college. It's still not too late to start a college savings plan, if you haven't already. Every little bit helps!
 - · Investigate state financial aid programs and 529 plans.
- Obtain a Social Security number for your child if you don't already have one. This is often required for applications, testing, scholarships, and other opportunities.

GRADE 10

- Meet with the school counselor again. Make sure
 your child meets with their school counselor to ensure
 that she or he is enrolled in college-preparatory courses.
 - Check to see that your child is taking any prerequisites to advanced-level junior- and senior-year courses.
- 2. Ask if the PSAT 10 or PSAT/NMSQT is offered to 10th-graders. While the PSAT/NMSQT is usually taken in the 11th grade, it is also often offered in the 10th. That's because it provides invaluable feedback on the student score report; 10th-graders can then work on any disclosed academic weaknesses while there is still ample time to improve them.
- Is your child interested in attending a U.S. military academy? If so, they should request a precandidate questionnaire and complete it. Your school counselor can help with this.

- 4. Attend college and career fairs. These often take place in the fall at your school or in your area.
- Support your child's participation in a school activity or volunteer effort. Extracurricular activities help students develop time-management skills and enrich the school experience.
- 6. Tour college campuses. If possible, take advantage of vacation or other family travel opportunities to visit colleges and see what they're like.
 - Even if there is no interest in attending the college you are visiting, it will help your child learn what to look for in a college.

Family Action Plan: 11th Grade

Junior year usually marks a turning point. This is because for most students and families, it's when college planning activities kick into high gear. Here are some things you can do this year to support your child and give him or her the best options.

SUMMER

- Get the facts about what college costs. You may be surprised by how affordable higher education can be.
 Start by reading Understanding College Costs.
- Explore financial aid options. These include grants and scholarships, loans, and work-study programs that can help pay for college costs. Find out more about how financial aid can make college affordable.

FALL

- Make sure your child meets with the school counselor.
 This meeting is especially important this year as your
 11th-grader starts to engage in the college application process. Learn more about the counselor's role in applying to college.
- Help your child stay organized. Work with your 11th-grader to make weekly or monthly to-do lists to keep on top of the tasks required to get ready for applying to colleges. For more time management tips, see 8 Ways to Take Control of Your Time.
- Help your junior get ready for the PSAT/NMSQT* in October. This is a preliminary test that helps students practice for the SAT* and assess their academic skills. Juniors who score well on the test are also eligible for scholarship opportunities. Find out more about the PSAT/NMSQT.
- Encourage your child to set goals for the school year.
 Working toward specific goals helps your high school student stay motivated and focused.

WINTER

- Review PSAT/NMSQT results together by logging in to the student score reporting portal. Your child's score report shows what they should work on to get ready for college; lists Advanced Placement^e courses that might be a good match for them; and connects them to free, personalized SAT practice on Khan Academy^e based on their results.
- Help your child prepare for the SAT. Many juniors take the SAT in the spring so they can get a head start on

- planning for college. See which other tests your high school junior may need to take.
- Discuss taking challenging courses next year. Taking
 honors courses or college-level courses like Advanced
 Placement as a senior can help your child prepare for
 college work and these are also the courses that
 college admission officers like to see. Learn more about
 advanced classes.

WINTER (CONTINUED)

- Encourage your junior to consider taking SAT Subject
 Tests™. Many colleges require or recommend taking
 these tests to get a sense of your child's skills in a certain
 academic area. In general, it's best to take a Subject Test
 right after taking the relevant course. Learn more about
 SAT Subject Tests.
- Encourage your child to take AP® Exams. If your 11th-grader takes AP or other advanced classes, have him or her talk with teachers now about taking these tests in May. Read more about the AP Program.

SPRING

- Search together for colleges that meet your child's needs. Once you have an idea of the qualities your child is looking for in a college, help him or her enter these criteria into College Search to create a list of colleges to which he or she should consider applying.
- Help your child research scholarships. This form of financial aid provides money for college that doesn't need to be repaid, Learn more through the College Board's Scholarship Search.
- Attend college fairs and financial aid events. These
 events allow you to meet with college representatives
 and get answers to questions. Your child can ask the
 school counselor how to find events in your area. Check
 out the College Fair Checklist for more information.
- Help your child make summer plans. Summer is a
 great time to explore interests and learn new skills —
 and colleges look for students who pursue meaningful
 summer activities. Help your high school student look into
 summer learning programs or find a job or internship.
- Visit colleges together. Make plans to check out the campuses of colleges in which your child is interested.
 Use the Campus Visit Checklist to learn how to get the most out of these experiences.
- Remind your child, if they are a student-athlete, to ask the school counselor at the end of the year to send or upload their transcript to the NCAA Eligibility Center. If your child took classes at more than one high school or program, an official transcript must be submitted for each school.

Frequently Asked Questions

Why should students take the PSAT/NMSQT[®] or the PSAT[™] 10?

The PSAT/NMSQT or the PSAT 10 offer great preparation for the SAT*.

Students who take the PSAT/NMSQT in 11th grade and meet other program entry requirements may enter the National Merit* Scholarship Program. They may also qualify for other programs such as the National Hispanic Recognition Program. For more information, see your student's counselor.

Students who take the PSAT/NMSQT or the PSAT 10 will receive both an online score report at studentscores.collegeboard.org and an official paper score report. They will receive an overall test score (320–1520) as well as individual section scores, test scores, cross-test scores, and subscores. Students will be able to see which answers they got right or wrong. They will also receive information on how to improve their academic skills.

Students will receive free, personalized, online SAT practice recommendations on Khan Academy, which can be used to prepare for both PSAT/NMSQT and PSAT 10 because of the close alignment of the tests.

Who should take the PSAT/NMSQT?

Typically, students take the PSAT/NMSQT in grade 11 of high school. Younger students can also take the test or the PSAT 10 to get a head start on improving skills and knowledge needed for success in college and career.

How many times may a student take each test?

Only once a year, but there is no limit to how many years a student may participate. It is

important that 11th-grade students take the PSAT/NMSQT to enter the National Merit Scholarship Program and to get SAT practice.

What should be done to prepare for the test?

Classroom learning is the basis for test questions, so the best way students can prepare is by taking challenging courses and becoming familiar with the test and its format. Students should review the Official Student Guide, along with the practice test for the test they are taking to help them understand all the directions and be familiar with the types of questions that will be asked. In addition, students who take the practice test can go to collegeboard.org/psatpractice for free, personalized practice based on their practice test results, which can be used to prepare for the SAT, the PSAT/NMSQT, or the PSAT 10.

If students don't do well on the test, will it hurt their chances of getting into college?

Absolutely not. If anything, the test will improve their chances, since it provides personalized information on the types of skills that the student needs to improve to prepare for the SAT and college. PSAT/NMSQT and PSAT 10 scores are not sent to colleges.

What is Student Search Service⁶, and should students choose to participate?

When students take the PSAT/NMSQT or PSAT 10, they are asked if they would like to participate in the College Board's Student Search Service, a free service that provides names of students to certified educational organizations. If students choose to participate, they allow colleges, universities, scholarship programs, and educational opportunity organizations to send information about the educational and financial aid opportunities they offer. Beginning with the 2015 administration, students who opt in to Student Search Service will increase their access to nearly \$180 million in combined annual scholarship awards. Student information is strictly monitored and secure, and individual test scores are never shared with any outside entity.

How Your Child Can Do Their Best on the SAT®

Start Early

Students should start practicing the skills that are the most important for college readiness as early as possible. If students begin six months before the test, they should have time to work on strengthening some of their skills that need the most work and to become familiar with the test format.

Practice Consistently

Students who practice regularly tend to improve their college readiness skills at faster rates than those students who don't practice. Consider encouraging your child to practice at least 30 minutes a day, two times a week, based on their personalized plan from Official SAT Practice on Khan Academy (satpractice.org).

Work Hard

The SAT is aligned to what students are already learning in class, so the most important thing your child can do is take and commit to challenging courses, along with working hard on Official SAT Practice.

Mix Up Their Practice

In addition to taking advantage of Official SAT Practice, make sure your child studies by reading and summarizing both fiction and nonfiction passages from a variety of sources, creating and solving word problems, and reading editorial content to review argument construction.





ESPORTS GAMING CLUB: Los jugadores de todos los niveles de experiencia pueden disfrutar del mundo de los deportes electrónicos en un entorno divertido y competitivo. Los estudiantes tendrán la oportunidad de jugar a nivel recreativo o competitivo.

ALIANZA GAY/HETEROSEXUAL (GSA): Una coalición de gay, lesbiana, bisexual, transgénico, e individuos heterosexuales ofreciendo apoyo, aceptación, y conciencia en un ambiente seguro. Los estudiantes pueden participar en cualquier número de actividades para hacer de la sexualidad, identidad sexual, e identidad de género una parte aceptada de la Escuela Superior de Huntington.

A Planning List for Parents of Ninthand 10th-Graders

It may seem early to start thinking about getting your child ready for college, but it really isn't — important groundwork should take place in ninth and 10th grades. Here's a list to help you make sure your child is on the right path.

GRADE 9

- Create a four-year high school plan. Once your child is settled into ninth grade, introduce the idea of preparing an overall plan for high school that relates to their goals.
 - Make sure you and your child know what high school courses are required by colleges, and that their ninthgrade courses are on the right track.
 - Map out when these courses should be taken.
 - Familiarize yourself with the various levels of courses offered by your child's school.
- Tell your child to start thinking about careers.
 Encourage your child to develop a tentative career goal.
 Of course it will change often but it's the thought process that counts.
 - Help your child to identify interests likes and dislikes — not just in academics but in all areas. This will help your child focus on goals.
 - Encourage your child to discuss career options with others, such as the school counselor, teachers, recent college graduates who are working, professionals in the community, etc.
- Suggest extracurricular activities. Encourage your child to actively take part in a sport, school club, music or drama group, or community volunteer activity.
 - If your child may want to play sports in college, research the National College Athletic Association

- eligibility requirements. The NCAA requires completion of certain core courses; you can find the specifics at www.eligibilitycenter.org.
- 4. Meet with the school counselor. The school counselor knows how to help your child get the most out of high school. Make sure your child has an opportunity during the school year to discuss post-high-school plans with the school counselor and map out courses to take during the rest of high school.
 - · You should participate in this meeting, too.
- 5. Ask if the PSAT 8/9™ is offered to ninth-graders. The PSAT 8/9 will help you and your child's teachers figure out what your child needs to work on the most so that they're ready for college when they graduate from high school. It tests the same skills and knowledge as the SAT®, PSAT/NMSQT®, and PSAT™ 10 in a way that makes sense for their grade level.
- Save for college. It's still not too late to start a college savings plan, if you haven't already. Every little bit helps!
 - Investigate state financial aid programs and 529 plans.
- Obtain a Social Security number for your child if you don't already have one. This is often required for applications, testing, scholarships, and other opportunities.

GRADE 10

- Meet with the school counselor again. Make sure your child meets with their school counselor to ensure that she or he is enrolled in college-preparatory courses.
 - Check to see that your child is taking any prerequisites to advanced-level junior- and senior-year courses.
- 2. Ask if the PSAT 10 or PSAT/NMSQT is offered to 10th-graders. While the PSAT/NMSQT is usually taken in the 11th grade, it is also often offered in the 10th. That's because it provides invaluable feedback on the student score report; 10th-graders can then work on any disclosed academic weaknesses while there is still ample time to improve them.
- Is your child interested in attending a U.S. military academy? If so, they should request a precandidate questionnaire and complete it. Your school counselor can help with this.

- 4. Attend college and career fairs. These often take place in the fall at your school or in your area.
- Support your child's participation in a school activity or volunteer effort. Extracurricular activities help students develop time-management skills and enrich the school experience.
- 6. Tour college campuses. If possible, take advantage of vacation or other family travel opportunities to visit colleges and see what they're like.
 - Even if there is no interest in attending the college you are visiting, it will help your child learn what to look for in a college.

Family Action Plan: 11th Grade

Junior year usually marks a turning point. This is because for most students and families, it's when college planning activities kick into high gear. Here are some things you can do this year to support your child and give him or her the best options.

SUMMER

- Get the facts about what college costs. You may be surprised by how affordable higher education can be.
 Start by reading Understanding College Costs.
- Explore financial aid options. These include grants and scholarships, loans, and work-study programs that can help pay for college costs. Find out more about how financial aid can make college affordable.

FALL

- Make sure your child meets with the school counselor.
 This meeting is especially important this year as your
 11th-grader starts to engage in the college application process. Learn more about the counselor's role in applying to college.
- Help your child stay organized. Work with your 11th-grader to make weekly or monthly to-do lists to keep on top of the tasks required to get ready for applying to colleges. For more time management tips, see 8 Ways to Take Control of Your Time.
- Help your junior get ready for the PSAT/NMSQT in October. This is a preliminary test that helps students practice for the SAT and assess their academic skills. Juniors who score well on the test are also eligible for scholarship opportunities. Find out more about the PSAT/NMSQT.
- Encourage your child to set goals for the school year.
 Working toward specific goals helps your high school student stay motivated and focused.

WINTER

- Review PSAT/NMSQT results together by logging in to the student score reporting portal. Your child's score report shows what they should work on to get ready for college; lists Advanced Placement° courses that might be a good match for them; and connects them to free, personalized SAT practice on Khan Academy° based on their results.
- Help your child prepare for the SAT. Many juniors take the SAT in the spring so they can get a head start on

- planning for college. See which other tests your high school junior may need to take.
- Discuss taking challenging courses next year. Taking honors courses or college-level courses like Advanced Placement as a senior can help your child prepare for college work — and these are also the courses that college admission officers like to see. Learn more about advanced classes.

WINTER (CONTINUED)

- Encourage your junior to consider taking SAT Subject Tests™. Many colleges require or recommend taking these tests to get a sense of your child's skills in a certain academic area. In general, it's best to take a Subject Test right after taking the relevant course. Learn more about SAT Subject Tests.
- Encourage your child to take AP® Exams. If your 11th-grader takes AP or other advanced classes, have him or her talk with teachers now about taking these tests in May. Read more about the AP Program.

SPRING

- Search together for colleges that meet your child's needs. Once you have an idea of the qualities your child is looking for in a college, help him or her enter these criteria into College Search to create a list of colleges to which he or she should consider applying.
- Help your child research scholarships. This form of financial aid provides money for college that doesn't need to be repaid. Learn more through the College Board's Scholarship Search.
- Attend college fairs and financial aid events. These
 events allow you to meet with college representatives
 and get answers to questions. Your child can ask the
 school counselor how to find events in your area. Check
 out the College Fair Checklist for more information.
- Help your child make summer plans. Summer is a
 great time to explore interests and learn new skills —
 and colleges look for students who pursue meaningful
 summer activities. Help your high school student look into
 summer learning programs or find a job or internship.
- Visit colleges together. Make plans to check out the campuses of colleges in which your child is interested.
 Use the Campus Visit Checklist to learn how to get the most out of these experiences.
- Remind your child, if they are a student-athlete, to ask the school counselor at the end of the year to send or upload their transcript to the NCAA Eligibility Center. If your child took classes at more than one high school or program, an official transcript must be submitted for each school.

Frequently Asked Questions

Why should students take the PSAT/NMSQT® or the PSAT™ 10?

The PSAT/NMSQT or the PSAT 10 offer great preparation for the SAT*.

Students who take the PSAT/NMSQT in 11th grade and meet other program entry requirements may enter the National Merit* Scholarship Program. They may also qualify for other programs such as the National Hispanic Recognition Program. For more information, see your student's counselor.

Students who take the PSAT/NMSQT or the PSAT 10 will receive both an online score report at studentscores.collegeboard.org and an official paper score report. They will receive an overall test score (320–1520) as well as individual section scores, test scores, cross-test scores, and subscores. Students will be able to see which answers they got right or wrong. They will also receive information on how to improve their academic skills.

Students will receive free, personalized, online SAT practice recommendations on Khan Academy, which can be used to prepare for both PSAT/NMSQT and PSAT 10 because of the close alignment of the tests.

Who should take the PSAT/NMSQT?

Typically, students take the PSAT/NMSQT in grade 11 of high school. Younger students can also take the test or the PSAT 10 to get a head start on improving skills and knowledge needed for success in college and career.

How many times may a student take each test?

Only once a year, but there is no limit to how many years a student may participate. It is

important that 11th-grade students take the PSAT/NMSQT to enter the National Merit Scholarship Program and to get SAT practice.

What should be done to prepare for the test?

Classroom learning is the basis for test questions, so the best way students can prepare is by taking challenging courses and becoming familiar with the test and its format. Students should review the Official Student Guide, along with the practice test for the test they are taking to help them understand all the directions and be familiar with the types of questions that will be asked. In addition, students who take the practice test can go to collegeboard.org/psatpractice for free, personalized practice based on their practice test results, which can be used to prepare for the SAT, the PSAT/NMSQT, or the PSAT 10.

if students don't do well on the test, will it hurt their chances of getting into college?

Absolutely not. If anything, the test will improve their chances, since it provides personalized information on the types of skills that the student needs to improve to prepare for the SAT and college. PSAT/NMSQT and PSAT 10 scores are not sent to colleges.

What is Student Search Service®, and should students choose to participate?

When students take the PSAT/NMSQT or PSAT 10, they are asked if they would like to participate in the College Board's Student Search Service, a free service that provides names of students to certified educational organizations. If students choose to participate, they allow colleges, universities, scholarship programs, and educational opportunity organizations to send information about the educational and financial aid opportunities they offer, Beginning with the 2015 administration, students who opt in to Student Search Service will increase their access to nearly \$180 million in combined annual scholarship awards. Student information is strictly monitored and secure, and individual test scores are never shared with any outside entity.



FOR PARENTS

How Your Child Can Do Their Best on the SAT®

Start Early

Students should start practicing the skills that are the most important for college readiness as early as possible. If students begin six months before the test, they should have time to work on strengthening some of their skills that need the most work and to become familiar with the test format.

Practice Consistently

Students who practice regularly tend to improve their college readiness skills at faster rates than those students who don't practice. Consider encouraging your child to practice at least 30 minutes a day, two times a week, based on their personalized plan from Official SAT Practice on Khan Academy (satpractice.org).

Work Hard

The SAT is aligned to what students are already learning in class, so the most important thing your child can do is take and commit to challenging courses, along with working hard on Official SAT Practice.

Mix Up Their Practice

In addition to taking advantage of Official SAT Practice, make sure your child studies by reading and summarizing both fiction and nonfiction passages from a variety of sources, creating and solving word problems, and reading editorial content to review argument construction.




