Department Director

Dr. Rob Wottawa studied classical guitar at Franklin Pierce University and earned his master's in music education at LIU Post. After teaching at Longwood for five years, he was awarded the Wallace Grant to attend Stony Brook for school and district leadership.

As Department Chair of Art, FACS, and Music he began his doctorate in Education at LIU Post and as Director of Art, ENL, Music, and World Languages at East Islip completed his Educational Doctorate with a focus on mentoring new teachers.

Currently the Director of Fine and Performing Arts at Huntington UFSD, he's an avid writer, podcaster, and co-founder of LIE (Long Island Educators). Dr. Wottawa is excited to lead the fine arts and music programs!

Art Teachers

Jennifer Fazin, a graduate of Cold Spring Harbor High School, has served as a K–12 certified art teacher in the Huntington School District since September 2019. She holds a BFA in Advertising Design from FIT and a master's degree in art education from C.W. Post and brings over 25 years of professional graphic design and print industry experience as the owner and operator of an advertising print shop into her instruction.

At Huntington High School, Ms. Fazin has taught Creative Crafts, Media Art, Studio Art, Drawing and Painting and she currently teaches high school Ceramics Sculpture 1 and 7th grade art at J. Taylor Finley Middle School. She has played a key role in expanding and supporting multiple art programs, adapting instruction to ensure equitable access to materials and learning.

Ms. Fazin has also instructed adult education program ceramics and watercolor classes, which have grown significantly due to high enrollment, and has taught in the district's SCOPE summer program. She has contributed to district-wide initiatives through large-scale wall graphic installations celebrating school identity, athletics, and diversity. In 2023-2025 she co-led the Huntington High School Art Honor Society to national recognition through student service and permanent hand painted wall mural installations across the district.

Ayallah Jeddah has been a Huntington art teacher since September 2006. She is a graduate of Syosset High School. She obtained her BFA from the University of Connecticut and her master's in education from Hofstra University. She started her teaching career as a leave replacement in Syosset high school before coming to Huntington High School. She has taught black/white and color photography, digital photography, AP 2D, Media Arts, Studio Art, Computer Graphics, Ceramics, and has taught 7th/8th grade art and Studio Art. In addition, she also taught the summer arts program and served as faculty advisor for the Art Honor Society.

Nicholas Matarazzo serves as the art teacher at Washington and Flower Hill Primary School. He graduated from Huntington High School in 2013 and attended Jefferson Primary

School, Woodhull Intermediate, and Finley Middle School. He holds an associate's degree from Suffolk Community College, a bachelor's degree in graphic design from Farmingdale State College, and a master's degree in education from CUNY Queens College. Besides his role in art education, he is also the Assistant Varsity Baseball Coach at Huntington High School.

Jenna Merget holds a bachelor's degree in fine arts education from Hofstra University and a master's degree in studio art from Adelphi University. She brings creativity, enthusiasm, and a deep love of school spirit to her work in the Huntington UFSD.

Beyond the art room, Mrs. Merget is an active presence in the school community, co-hosting events and supporting the girls' golf program. Known for her positive energy, she's often found brightening the halls with a warm smile and an encouraging word for students and staff alike.

Kasmira Mohanty is a highly respected digital arts educator at Huntington High School, where she has taught since 2001. She holds degrees from the Fashion Institute of Technology, Purchase College, and Dowling College, and served as the faculty advisor for Huntington's Art Honor Society from 2008 to 2017. Her program empowers students to create award-winning work while preparing them for successful careers in the creative industries. Many of her former students now work professionally in digital art, design, and related fields.

Over the course of her tenure, Kasmira's program and professional practice have received national recognition, including more than 15 features in *School Arts Magazine*, where she serves as a writer and Contributing Editor. She has hosted the Davis Publications Media Arts Intensive, was a featured guest on Episode 25, *The Perceptions of Digital Arts*, on the K12ArtChat podcast, and featured in Davis's book collections *CONTEMPORARYart* and *MEDIAarts*. In addition, she has collaborated with school districts across the United States to help curate and develop digital arts programs.

Beyond the classroom, Ms. Mohanty is an award-winning commercial, exhibiting, and installation artist, with work shown locally and internationally, including exhibitions in Croatia and Los Angeles. In 2024, she was honored by the Heckscher Museum of Art as part of its Celebration in Achievement Benefit. She serves on the Executive Boards of the Huntington Arts Council and SCALA (Suffolk County Art Leaders Association), and is a member of the Education and Visitor Experience Committee at the Heckscher Museum of Art.

Karen Morea began her career at Huntington in 2006. She taught elementary art at Washington, Jefferson and Southdown primary schools and Huntington Intermediate School, which was later closed and reopened as Jack Abrams STEM Magnet School. She later moved to J. Taylor Finley Middle School, where she has taught seventh and eighth grade art classes for the past ten years. She is now the Intermediate level art teacher at both Jack Abrams STEM and Woodhull Intermediate and loves the energy her students bring to class there each day.

A graduate of Our Lady of Mercy Academy in Syosset, Ms. Morea obtained her undergraduate degree at SUNY Geneseo with a focus on studio art. She earned a master's in art education degree at Long Island University-CW Post.

She is a graduate of Half Hollow Hills High School West and after beginning college at USC, obtained an undergraduate degree from LIU Post and graduate degrees from New York Tech and Hofstra University. She has worked tirelessly to build the Huntington Film Program into the prestigious program that it is today. Her students participate in State and National Film competitions, winning them numerous awards and recognition.

She is an active member of BASH, Long Island's Broadcasting Alliance for Senior High, where she and her students collaborate with other Long Island school districts and compete for broadcasting awards.

Music Teachers

Tara Adams has been teaching in Huntington UFSD since 1997. A graduate of Walt Whitman High School, she went on to earn a B.M. in music education and music performance at the Crane School of Music, SUNY Potsdam. She received her M.M. in music education at Ithaca College. As an educator, Mrs. Adams has worked with young students throughout Long Island as

a guest conductor for both SCMEA and NMEA All-County Bands, and as a certified NYSSMA brass adjudicator. Mrs. Adams has presented professional workshops both locally and at the state level. As a horn player, she has greatly enjoyed performing with the Northport Community Band for 30 years, as well as many other local ensembles.

Her experience spans both the public school system—teaching students from kindergarten through high school—and the El Sistema non-profit sector, where she has provided orchestra instruction to students who otherwise would not have access to music education.

Ms. Flynn studied violin with Thomas Karolyi, the founding orchestra teacher of Finley Middle School, making her new home in the Huntington School District a particularly meaningful full-circle moment. She was the youngest student ever accepted into his private studio. She plays seven instruments, is a proud mom, and is also an amateur International Latin Ballroom dance competitor.

Jason Giachetti has been a Huntington music teacher since September 2000. He is a graduate of Massapequa High School and obtained undergraduate and graduate degrees at SUNY Potsdam and the Crane School of Music and Hofstra University and is currently pursuing a Doctor of Musical Arts in percussion performance at Five Towns College.
