JUSTICE FOR KAVANAUGH

Justice for Kavanaugh, you read the title correct. Despite weeks of allegations, Mr. Brett Kavanaugh was named the 114th Supreme Court Justice of The United States.

After months of Democratic officials attempting to block Brett Kavanaugh's confirmation with claims that he didn't represent the people or was too-far right, information was released in early September which stated that Mr. Kavanaugh reportedly sexually assaulted a woman from high school at a party in the summer of 1982. THE DRESS CODE: SAFE OR DISCRIMINATORY?

Are you an individual who comes to school everyday, in fear of being stopped by a faculty member due to your outfit? Are you still scared even though your outfit seems as appropriate for school? I'd have to say that I feel this way. Each school has an established dress code, which ensures the safety of all students and faculty. However, in recent years the dress code has been unnecessarily enforced. Both girls and boys get dress coded, but lately, girls have been under the microscope in what they wear to school. Examples of what girls/guys may get dress coded for are exposed backs, plunging necklines, short shorts/skirts, or clothes that may be too tight fitting. Faculty members and administration believe that wearing these garments distracts students.

In today's society, males are most commonly distracted by females. This is one of the main reasons as to why there is an established dress code in the first place. However, any student male or female should be able to come to school in whatever makes them feel comfortable. Even if boys are distracted by a girl's clothing, why is it the girl's fault? Are exposed shoulders really a danger to others? The dress code is also strongly tied to discrimination. All girls come in different shapes and sizes. A girl who has a larger chest and wears a long tank top to school, cannot control if the top rides up, or if it looks more tight fitting.

*Our principal has taken the concerns of this article, among others about the dress code, into consideration. Mr. Cusack has stated: "Over the years that I've been here, both as an Assistant Principal and Principal, I have come across a number of concerns from parents and students about the current dress code and its implementation. In taking a further look at this, I've found that there is a lot of literature nationwide about how one might consider revisions of a dress code to ensure that practices are equitable, fair and supportive of students' self-image, while maintaining an academic environment. This is something I've shared with a number of leadership groups in our school community, and we are currently taking a close look at our practices to see if changes are needed. This process may take a little time, but I do believe a review is warranted. My hope is that we can eventually come up with a balanced policy that works for everyone and which supports a healthy school culture".

With that being addressed, it's time to dive into one of the biggest hearings in decades: Brett Kavanaugh, Associate Supreme Court Justice vs. Doctor Christine Blasey Ford, research psychologist at Stanford School of Medicine and professor at Palo Alto University. In July, 2018, Dr. Ford spoke out about her assault for the first time with a therapist in couples counseling, not specifically giving names, but stating she was attacked by a couple of boys from an "elitist boys school" and the men became "highly respected and high-ranking members of society in Washington" (a statement which was verified by the therapist) and in the same year she said Kavanaugh (a federal judge at the time) was the one who committed the act, personally to her husband. Flash forward to July 2018, Ford contacted a California democratic congresswoman Anna G Eshoo and wrote a letter describing her assault which was to be published anonymously for fear of damage to her career and family life. After facts became skewed and the legitimacy of the claim

from the anonymous source was questioned, she finally decided to come out as the accuser. This blossomed into nationwide gossip and eventually a hear-

ing was set in place for September 24th, 2018.

Rather than addressing every technical aspect of the day long hearing, I want to give a brief overview. The main issue at large was Ford's credibility. Most of the population, surprisingly including Donald Trump, found her to be a credible witness, but thought her lack of details regarding the exact whereabouts of the party, how she got home, etc. automatically means Kavanaugh wasn't the one who committed the act. Three women recounting tales of extremely similar assaults by the same perpetrator should be enough. Past friends and roommates expressing how much of an excessive and sloppy drinker Kavanaugh was should be enough. The laughing faces of Brett Kavanaugh and Mark Judge forever ingrained in Dr. Ford's memory, as she recalled during her portion of hearing, should be enough. A

hearing in front of a sea of old white men who have never experienced assault should be enough. A truthful polygraph test should be enough. A call for an extensive FBI investigation should be enough. I believe in due process of the law, I believe in the right to a fair hearing, and I believe in senators right to vote for the end decision, but when everything that needed to be said is said and everything needed to be done is done (aside from a more thorough FBI investigation and hearings for the two other accusers) and the odds still aren't in favor for survivors, that's when a change has to happen. When senators say they believe Ford and are given ample evidence needed to prove someone guilty in a hearing (a job interview essentially, not even a criminal trial) and the fact that Kavanaugh committed the act is denied because of personal experience of your beloved family member, being a 'good man,' a 'good friend,' the star of the football team, or even an Ivy League graduate, you aren't believing survivors. It's not hard to believe that Kavanaugh, a man who asks Amy Klobuchar, a senior senator of 12 years, who just happens to be

the daughter of an alcoholic (which was stated just seconds before in court) if she's ever been blackout drunk in a panicked, defensive, elementary school like response to a question initially directed at him, the 'defendant', is lying under oath. Meanwhile, Dr. Ford kept composure and answered every single question to the best of her ability, the only things that weren't fully answered she, a renowned psychologist, explained with simplified neurobiology. She stated "The level of norepinephrine and epinephrine in the brain, that sort of, as you know, encodes that neurotransmitter encodes memories into the hippocampus, so the trauma-related experience is locked there, whereas other details kind of drift." This knowledge is widespread amongst psychologists, but many still decide to disprove her experience by stating she has gaps in her story and people she said were there could not remember the party. Speaking on behalf of every high school student who has been to a party, it's quite likely they wouldn't remember a singular night 36 years ago where they were probably drinking and nothing as significant as Ford's

experience happened to them. But when Brett Kavanaugh clearly lies, under oath, about the sexual and drinking terms referenced in his yearbook and his infamous 'alumnus rene' sexual reference to his close high school friend (who stated she had no clue he said that and found it disgusting) he is constantly excused. On October 4th, 2018, the senate judiciary committee came to the decision with a 50-48 vote to allow Judge Kavanaugh serve on the Supreme court. My question here is, how can we trust a system that claims its basic values are justice, freedom, and equality when those same values aren't granted to marginalized people?

I would like to conclude by urging you to do your research about the upcoming November 6th elections. Spread the knowledge to your family members, have difficult conversations, and vote/register to vote if you can and tell those around you to do the same, because your voice matters. "We were all human until race disconnected us, religion separated us, politics divided us, and wealth classified us." Stand for human rights.

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...September 27th, the two spoke out at a testimony in front of Congress, both discussing and answering questions about the event. The testimony that kept Americans glued to their tv's was emotional for both sides. Ford appeared distraught describing the event while Kavanaugh was evidently destroyed, in disbelief that someone would make such a claim against him. 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THE UN GENERAL ASSEMBLY: THE GOOD, THE BAD, THE UGLY, AND WHAT IT MEANS FOR THE UNITED STATES

On September 18th, the General Assembly Hall in New York City opened its doors for the 73th UN General Assembly. After the initial days of brisk meetings and introductions, the General Assembly kicked off one of the several headlining high-level meetings: the Nelson Mandela Peace Summit. The summit, celebrating the life and legacy of Nelson Mandela on his 100th birthday, opened with the unveiling of a life-sized statue of the former South African President. Following that, delegates reached a decision to declare the next ten years, 2019 to 2028, the “Nelson Mandela decade of Peace,” which aims to carry on Mandela’s legacy of human rights. World leaders also promised to “redouble efforts to pursue international peace and security, development and human rights.” However, at one point, the summit was not as peaceful and friendly sounding as its name.

While praising Mandela’s dedication to improving relations among others, President Hassan Rouhani, the current President of Iran, delivered some scalding remarks aimed at President Trump. Rouhani stated that Mandela had sown



seeds of “Compassion and amity... [while] this is a historical reality that great statesmen tend

to build bridges instead of walls,” His comments are a direct dig at Trump’s 2016 presidential campaign platform, which called for a wall to be built between the USA and Mexico to prevent mass immigration. The United States and Iran have become bitter enemies in recent time, with tensions increasing after the Trump’s subsequent abandonment of the 2015 Iran Nuclear Deal.

Nonetheless, the summit ended on a positive light, leading to the commencement of high level

debates and speeches the next day. All eyes were turned to one speech especially, President Trump’s own. Scheduled for a 10 a.m. start, Trump arrived only to what can be described as fashionably late, 15 minutes later. His speech could be described as something out of his own playbook. Immediately in his speech he clapped back at Iran, stating that the nation is “the world’s leading sponsor of terrorism,” with severe threats directed towards its leader. Following that, he denounced the concept of globalism in support of his favored “America First” policy. Continuing, he went on to state that he “accomplished more than almost any administration in the history of our country,” but was met with laughter from fellow delegates on the floor. Trump’s speech also slammed Venezuela, as he gave a warning to the hall to resist so-

cialism “at all costs.” The only nation he seemed to praise was North Korea, whose leader, Kim Jong Un, he praised after his “historical” summit with the nation earlier this year in Indonesia. Ironically, Trump’s praise and positivity was rather short lived, as he then went to circle back remarks at Iran for the remainder of his speech.

SEXUAL HARASSMENT AND ASSAULT IS STILL A PROBLEM, GUYS.

In late September of this year, the Senate Judiciary Committee hearings over Supreme Court nominee Brett Kavanaugh took the world by storm. This was in part because of the testimonies of both Kavanaugh and professor of psychology Christine Blasey Ford, who accused Kavanaugh of sexually assaulting her at a party in the early 80's. Ford's accusation and testimony prompted an FBI investigation into Kavanaugh's background, as well as two more accusations of sexual assault against him from Deborah Ramirez and Julie Swetnick. Despite this, Kavanaugh was still elected to be on the supreme court. Regardless of whether these allegations are true or not, the fact that the government put an accused attempted rapist in a life-long position to judge the privileges of the American people is incredibly concerning.

The hearings have also prompted multiple discussions of sexual harassment in the media, with questions about what counts as harassment and if decisions someone makes as a teenager/college student should follow them for the rest of their life. Well, since everyone's still really confused about this issue, and the issue itself won't go

away anytime soon, this article will take the liberty to dispel some common myths and/or excuses surrounding sexual harassment, as well as telling its readers why they really need to care about this pervasive problem in American society.

"What Is Sexual Harassment?" Sexual harassment is, according to Google, "harassment (typically of women) in a workplace, or other professional or social situation, involving the making of unwanted sexual advances or obscene remarks." prevent victims from coming forward. By the time some work up the courage to speak about their harassment or assaults, it's a significant amount of time later, prompting disbelief and accusations of lying, such as:

"They're Just Saying They Were Assaulted to Get Attention!" Ah yes, because I can clearly remember all of

the Bill Cosby victims who came out and instantaneously became millionaires! Look, while some people undoubtedly lie about being harassed or assaulted, they are not the majority in any way, shape or form. If anything, coming out about harassment is one of the most dangerous things to do in society. Ford herself had to relocate her entire family after telling her story, as so many people had sent her disturbing threats of violence and death. If a person reveals themselves as a victim of sexual harassment, they should at the very least be treated with the utmost respect until the assault is proven.

"If The Victim Was Doing N/A, Then They Were Asking For It!" The circumstances surrounding the victim at the time of their assault in no way justifies the individually made decisions of the assaulter. Wearing a revealing outfit doesn't make everyone in a 3-mile radius physically unable to not sexually assault or harass that person. The same goes for drinking/doing drugs at a party, or even just walking alone late at night. It's never the victim's fault for the assault happening, it's the fault of the assaulter for making the conscious choice to do said assault. It's also the fault of everyone who...

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...assisted in the assault/turned the other way when it was happening, but that's another story. I think the main point I'm trying to make here is STOP BLAMING THE VICTIMS OF CRIMES WHEN THE CRIMINALS ARE THE ONES AT FAULT AND KNEW EXACTLY WHAT THEY WERE DOING.

"C'mon, All Teenagers Do Stuff Like This, It Shouldn't Follow Them Forever!" Well, as an actual teenager, I can say with 100% certainty that rampant sexual harassment is never a symptom of puberty. If a teenager is revealed to have committed a heinous sexual act, or at the very least participated in some unpleasant and explicit behavior, they should be held accountable for it no matter what. On top of that, it's more likely that the assaulter ruined the victim's life more than they ruined their own life. The assaulter made the conscious choice to bring pain and misery to someone, and the victim didn't. Besides, it's a little weird to hear the argument that we can't hold teenagers accountable for rape because it'll "ruin their future." Meanwhile minorities in America are sent to jail for over 50 years because of non-violent drug offenses that some commit as young as the age of 16. Shouldn't it be the other way around, that people who make non-violent decisions should be given a second chance and people who make violent

and morally wrong decisions shouldn't? Basically, It doesn't matter how old the assaulter was, sexual harassment is still sexual harassment, and committers of it must be held accountable for it.

Progressive Society, There's No Way This Is Happening Now!" Sadly, disembodied voice, it still is. 81% of women and 43% of men have reported being sexually harassed in their lifetime. Along with that, there are 321,500 victims of rape and sexual assault each year in America, with an assault happening every 98 seconds. People in the ages of 12-34 are at the highest risk of sexual assault, with 1 out of 6 women and 3% of men being a victim of attempted or completed rape every year. On top of that, females ages 16-19 are 4 times more likely than the general population to be the victims of rape, attempted rape, and sexual assault. Native Americans the ages of 12 and older experience 5900 sexual assaults per year, making them the race with the highest chance of sexual assault. Prisons and militaries also experience a wide array of assault: 80,600 inmates each year experience sexual violence while in pris-

on or jail, and 18,900 military members experienced unwanted sexual contact at the end of September 2014 alone. For the prison example, 60% of the sexual violence that occurred was perpetuated by jail or prison staff.

Colleges, meanwhile, contains some of the most rampant cases of sexual assault in the country (so much so that I had to write an entire paragraph about it). Female college students are 3 times more likely than any woman in general to experience sexual violence. Meanwhile, male students the age of 18-24 are 5 times more likely to be sexually assaulted than non students in the same

Used To!" ...Okay. Aside from the obviously traumatic results of sexual assault and violation, sexual harassment can have a serious effect on someone's mental health. People who experience sexual harassment are known to feel intense feelings of anger, discomfort, and embarrassment, which can be disastrous for one's mental health if it happens constantly and without intervention. For sexual assault, 94% of women who are raped experience symptoms of PTSD (Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder) during the two weeks following the rape, with 30% of women report symptoms of

ly to use cocaine, and 10 times more likely to use other major drugs. Victims are also at risk of pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections (STI)'s. This is especially bad considering our government's health care system and the most likely impending repeal of Roe vs. Wade. Sexual assault can also affect the victim's relationships with other people. 38% of victims experience problems with work or school, and 37% of victims have more frequent problems with friends and family. Problems can also arise for victims depending on who committed the assault: 84% of survivors who were vic-



age range. 21% or transgender students have also been sexually assaulted in college. Basically, college, a place where your supposed to learn and make new memories, is now a place where one of the most traumatic things that can happen to a person is extremely frequent.

PTSD nine months after the rape. 33% of women who were raped contemplate suicide, and 13% of women who are raped attempt suicide. 70% of rape or sexual assault victims experience moderate to severe distress, which is higher than any other victims of violent crimes. Drug use is also a common side effect of sexual assault, as assault victims are 3.4% more likely to use marijuana, 6 times more like-

timized by an intimate partner experience professional or emotional issues, including severe distress. 79% of survivors who were victimized by a family member and 67% of survivors who were victimized by a stranger experience these same issues. Overall, sexual assault can have long-lasting and horrific effects on victims that nobody should have to go through.

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“Okay, I Give Up, Victims Are Human Beings Who Actually Suffer. Do They At Least Get Justice?” Unfortunately, many don’t. While rapists and sexual assaulters get long prison sentences, only 6 out of every 1,000 perpetrators will end up in prison for their actions, despite many of these assaulters having a previous criminal history. This is probably because 57% of assaulters are white, but that’s a whole other can of worms. This lack of justice can be seen in popular media, most recently in the case of Brock Turner. The student athlete was assaulting an unconscious woman behind a dumpster before being caught

by two transfer students, after which he fled the scene until the two students caught him and held him down until the police arrived. Despite Turner, by all accounts, being guilty for one of the most heinous crimes imaginable, the judge gave him a light sentence because he “didn’t want to ruin the young man’s future.” Turner only had to serve half of this sentence because of “good behavior.” While Turner’s judge was overturned and Brock is still a registered sex offender, the fact that he, a rapist, was coddled throughout the entire case, with even his father describing the assault as “20 minutes of action,” shows how little the American justice sys-

tem cares about sexual assault. This can also be evident in our current President, Donald Trump, who admitted on tape to liking the fact that he can grab women’s

genitalia without repercussion. This tape was released right before the 2016 election, and yet he still won the presidency!

So basically sexual harassment and assault of this is very, very bad. What can we do to stop it? Well, for the court of public opinion, we should all try to keep

in mind the excuses this article just shut down and attempt to do the following: Respect other people’s boundaries, treat victims of sexual violence with dignity, and stop treating actual rapists like faberge eggs when it comes to punishments. From a more political standpoint, there’s actually a whole lot that we can do. The November midterms are coming up, and many of our seniors are eligible to vote. I will now speak to these seniors directly: please, for the love of god, vote in the midterms! Don’t throw it away just because you don’t like either candidate! Voting can help remove people from power that support sexual abusers and don’t support

victims or systems meant to protect victims. While we may be stuck with Kavanaugh for our entire lives, we can still make a difference. We can support victims of sexual assault, and we can also do everything in our power to make sure that those who commit it are held accountable. We shouldn’t have to live in a country where the victims are humiliated and the abusers are celebrated, or at the very least we should make sure the abusers aren’t put in charge of our rights. So, in conclusion, sexual harassment and assault are still problems, but that doesn’t mean we can’t solve them. We just have to put in the effort.

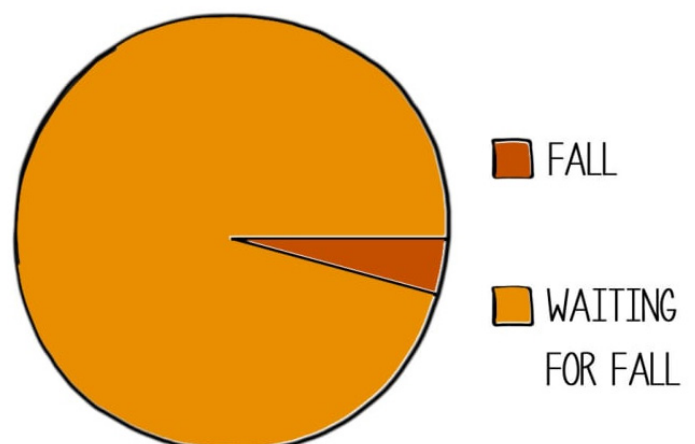

GAINING THE LIGHT:
A DESTINY 2 CAMPAIGN-MODE REVIEW

With - in the minute my brother told me Destiny 2 was on the September PlayStation Plus games list, I was already booting up my PS4. It was the perfect opportunity to get the game, due in

part because it was free for me at the time, but also because I was unsure if the sixty dollars was worth it. I needed to see for myself if Destiny 2 lived up to its precursor, and several months worth of time sitting around watching others play the game wasn't enough

for me. The fact that Destiny 2 was on the free games list was a sign, and this could be a sign for those of you who are undecided on getting the game or want to try something new. Unfortunately it's no longer free since September has come and gone.

I initially noticed the stunning graphics and music as the game was downloading. For me, this is a staple of Destiny, two of the most important elements that tie a game together. I was already pulled in, and the two hours it took for the game to complete-

ly download were agonizing. Good thing my excitement was built up at that point because the plot started off at a satisfyingly quick pace. It surprised me how Activision was able to maintain the depth of the plot despite the initial campaign mode being very short. For a little teaser, the plot begins with the Cabal laying siege to The Last City, and their leader, Ghoul, draining the Light from The Traveler. The storyline, as a whole, was amazing and very well thought out. With more of an understanding of the characters, planets, natural forces and other beings, I perceived...

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...the worldbuilding to be more cohesive towards the plot. Newer characters also contributed to this, but I'm trying my best to hold off on specific details since I don't want to spoil anything just yet. The interactions between characters seemed more natural compared to *Destiny*, and the humor this time around was impeccable, thanks to Cade-6 and Failsafe. But not everything was as good as I'm making out to be. So beware. There are going to be tons of spoilers ahead!

Before I go into depth about everything I loved about *Destiny 2*, I feel like I have to complain about some things. First of all, the loading screens and traveling cut scenes are still as long as ever. Don't get me wrong, I love staring at high quality and beautifully rendered graphics. It's just that the wait time feels unnecessarily long, especially if you're on the *Destiny 2* grind and



the storyline is at a point where it's too good to stop. Second to that was how tedious it was to constantly go back to The Shard (a piece of The Traveler that fell off) to play the same "mission" to receive a new subclass. It could have been better if there were a separate storyline each time that grants you a new subclass as you progress through the campaign mode. To me, it just seemed very repetitive, as you initially go to The Shard to get your Light back. Third, even though I love Ghost, at times its more humorous lines felt too cheesy or forced. The writers could have done

better, in my opinion, to make the lines fit Ghost's character. To be completely honest, Ghost would have been fine with the approach the writers had in the first game.

Throwing my complaints to the side, Ghoul's characterization really piqued my interest. He stole the Light and planned to use it to transform the Cabal into more powerful beings, but the fact that this was not made out to be an easy feat changed Ghoul as a character. Through learning about the Light through Speaker, Ghoul was able to develop into so much more

than the stereotypical "power hungry" villain. Speaker had value to Ghoul, since he was educating Ghoul about the Light. Because of this, the death of Speaker really hit close to home, causing Ghoul to betray his own kind due to influences of being worthy of the Light. At first it seemed heroic, but that was obviously not the intentions of writers. Ghoul took the Light for himself and became a towering light projection that was killed off by The Traveler. Obviously there was a lesson in all of this. Ghoul had to prove he was worthy to be able to receive a power that would

benefit others. He proved himself when he embodied the characteristics of someone who would wield the Light, but it all backfired due to his selfishness. His twisted perception of devotion, self-sacrifice, and death led to his demise. It's difficult to impose the morals of a hero onto yourself if you still succumb to your own greed, and that was the point of Ghoul's development. He was strongly changed by Speaker, but this change was adversely used to fuel his own desires. Overall, the outcome of the campaign mode really surprised me, since I've never witnessed such depth in an antagonist, besides Thanos.

For the sake in the length of this review, I am going to cap it off here. This will be one part of many, and I plan to talk about my favorite parts of the game, favorite characters, Expansions I and II (when I get the chance to play them), and whatever else interests me in the near future.

He's getting over 30 points every game. Tyler Boyd is a great wide receiver sleeper option. The Cincinnati Bengal receiver has proven efficient in the Bengal offense as he is targeted much more than other players increasing his point per reception (PPR) total. He's been getting about 20+ points lately because of his way of finding the end zone.

culture moment, their feud could no longer be denied. The NYFW fight was beyond embarrassing for female rap, on both sides. To fight at NYFW, in the presence of the Anna Wintour, is just sad. You truly cannot buy class. That night Cardi B went to Instagram accusing Nicki Minaj of speaking ill of her daughter, Kulture.

I believe Cardi B regarding her claims against Nicki Minaj. Nicki Minaj

That month,

when Nicki Minaj released her two opening singles, she addressed her then-rumored feud on a Beats 1 interview with Zane Lowe, expressing how Cardi B didn't show her enough respect. This is ridiculous, especially coming from a woman who disrespected other females when she came into the game. She never showed love to Lil Kim and let's not forget her decade-long feud with Remy Ma. I believe Nicki Minaj sees herself in Cardi B. She knows the tactics of the industry. I think our negative perception of Nicki Minaj was

what Atlantic Records intended and when you are labeled as the bad girl, you begin to give up and own it. That's why Nicki often refers to herself as the bad one.
